MONUMENT DEDICATED

In Memory of Deceased Heroes of Litchfield:

A throng of people witnessed the dedication of the soldiers' monument at Litchfield Plains Friday afternoon. The monument consists of two bases, a plinth cap and die, the whole surmounted by a soldier seven feet in height at parade rest. The monument itself is twenty-one feet high, and is made almost entirely from Hallowell granite. On the die the following inscription has been cut:

Erected A. D. 1907

by

Libby Relief Corps No. 73 and

Town of Litchfield

In Memory of

Her 200 Loyal Sons who Served

in the War of 1861-1865

Thus Aiding in the Preservation and Unity of the Nation

Libby post No. 93, G. A. R., preceded by the St. Celia band of Lewiston escorted the speakers, guests and Relief corps to a platform in front of the monument, and the meeting was called to order by the commander, who introduced the president of the day, George W. Earle. The invocation was pronounced by Rev. E. C. Stover, followed by music by the band.

The president of the day made appropriate remarks and called upon the president of the Relief corps to surrender the monument to the post for dedication. The president of the Relief corps, in a few well chosen words unveiled the monument and surrendered it for dedication. She was responded to by the commander of the post. A guard of honor was placed around the monument by the Relief corps, followed by the dedicatory prayer by the chaplain of the post. After a selection by the band the post dedicated the monument by the usual G. A. R. services.

The band played America and then short addresses were given by Hon. Samuel Smith, E. P. Springer, Hon. O. Smith and others. Another selection was played by the band and a poem written for the occasion by Mrs. Etta Taylor was read by her.

The dedicatory address was delivered by Dr. Smith Baker of Portland who spoke in his usual impressive manner.

The exercises closed with the lowering of the flag, the playing of "The Star Spangled Banner" by the band, also Taps and benediction.

is the oldest cross and the oldest symbol in the world. It dates from remotest antiquity and has been found all over the habitable world. In the ruins of ancient Rome, in the excavations of Grecian cities, graven on the solid rock of the mountains of India, on the vases and pottery of Rhodes, on ancient Buddhist idols and Chinese porcelains, on the relics of the Druids and Norsemen and on coins as early as 315 B. C.

On this continent the Swastika is found among the relics of the Mound Builders in Ohio and Tennessee, and the Cliff Dwellers in Colorado, in the ruins of Mexico, South and Central America.
